



Alumni Survey

We recently surveyed our Alumni to ask them to share their career stories. Often we start on a particular path and switch to new careers as opportunities arise, our interests change and as our skills and expertise develops. This is most common. It is often quoted that over the course of our working lives we may switch careers between 5-7 times.

STEM

Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths is a growing sector of our economy, particularly locally. At Trafalgar we want to encourage students to consider a career in these sectors. STEM subjects can give you loads of transferable skills, such as critical thinking, problem solving and working as part of a team. As they are often academically rigorous they tell an employer you are are both acdemically able and practically skilled. Every year we host a STEM fair at the school and would encourage you to get involved. Why not consider a career in a STEM subject, they are hugely varied.





Apprenticeships

An apprenticeship is a real job with training, so you can earn a wage while you learn and become fully trained in your chosen occupation by the end of the apprenticeship. Apprenticeships are open to people of all ages over the age of 16, enabling people to improve their skills and progress in their careers. Do not think of apprenticeships as a lower form of qualification. They are offered at all levels.

When we think of apprenticeships we often think of the trades - carpenter, plumber etc. However, there are any number of apprenticeships for people across most employment sectors. They start at all levels. You can find out more about apprenticeships and current vacancies using the links below.

Trafalgar 360

One of our aims is that during your time at The Trafalgar School, every student will have a range of wider opportunities both within and outside the curriculum - we refer to these opportunities as the Trafalgar 360. By being an active member of their form and House, students will be able to experience many of these opportunities every year, or even every term. Other experience will be available during activities week, or by taking advantage of the regular trips or visits which enhance our curriculum.

Careers Advisor

In Year 10 you will attend a small group workshop meeting with our Careers Advisor. The workshops are designed to help you understand the range of pathways available to you post 16 and to enable you to navigate your way to the pathway best suited to you.

Tailored to your academic performance and your aspirations, you will be given the knowledge, skills and confidence needed to explore all the options available to you on leaving the school. You will find out about the different local providers - Colleges, Sixth-Form and apprenticeships, the different types of qualifications (academic and vocational), the different levels of qualification (Foundation level through to Level 3), the different sizes of qualifications and entry requirements.

Following this workshop you can then make a personal appointment to meet with the Careers Advisor. See Mrs Ford.



Preparing for that all important next step



Personal Statement

A personal statement supports your application to study. It's a chance for you to articulate why you'd like to study a particular course or subject, and what skills and experience you possess that show your passion for your chosen field.

If you're applying for an apprenticeship or a job – you probably won't need to write a personal statement, but you'll need to prepare a CV. In PSHCE in Year 11 you will learn how to write an effective personal statement and begin the process of writing both a CV and personal statement.

Both Colleges and employers will want to know about your predicted GCSE Grades, your achievements and your contribution to school life.

Writing a great personal statement is a step into the likely interview. Have something to say and sell yourself. Make yourself stand out from the crowd! As a Trafalgar student we want you to both sell yourself and demonstrate what it means to 'be Trafalgar!'



Interview Ready

CV and Personal Statement done. We want to now prepare for any interview situation. Here is some good advice

- 1. Arrive early plan your journey and aim to get there 30 minutes before your interview time. This will give you time to re-read your application, notes, and questions you've prepared.
- 2. Don't forget important documents make sure you bring certificates, ID, or a portfolio if you're asked to.
- 3. Bring a copy of your application and some notes no-one expects you to remember everything. Bringing your application allows you to go over it before the interview, and having notes shows you've done your research. A list of questions about the course and school/college will remind you what you wanted to ask and shows you've done some preparation.
- 4. Strike a balance between formal and casual you need to look like you're taking it seriously, without looking too uncomfortable if you're not used to wearing smart clothes, such as a suit.
- 5. Don't let shyness or nerves get in the way easy to say and harder to do, but try to focus on helping the interviewer see you love the subject(s) or think this really is the course, programme, or place for you. Slouching, fidgeting, and avoiding eye contact all give the wrong signals, as will chewing gum and failing to put your phone on silent.
- 6. Be enthusiastic if applicable, refer to a club or facility other schools/colleges don't have. Show genuine interest and remember some good manners. Shake hands with the interviewer, speak clearly, and don't be afraid to ask them to repeat themselves if you didn't hear them properly the first time. Remember to thank them at the end.
- 7. Don't lie or get caught up in a half-truth because you want to impress if you're not really into sports, don't pretend to be. The same applies to other things too, like exam results or special achievements.
- 8. Most importantly, be yourself! Tell them what you're good at, what you like, what your plans are, and ask your questions. It's just as important you interview them to make sure it's the right next step for you.

And finally

THE NATIONAL CITIZEN SERVICE - NCS

The next step is now all sorted, exams are over - what next? Well - why not do something special? The National Citizen Service is designed specifically for 16 and 17 year olds.

NCS takes place in the Summer Holidays after your GCSEs. The NCS Experience is a 2-3 week residential programme living away from home and meeting new people. Cost £50 (Or free)

On NCS, you'll mix with a new crowd, and take on fresh challenges together. Before you know it, you'll be rooting for each other, as you all tackle your own little hurdles.

Along the way, you'll also get a taste for independence and pick up skills that'll help you smash your future goals.

And if that's not enough for you, you'll also be given a platform to have your voice heard and pursue a passion project.
